PLANT OF THE MONTH by Kate

Paeonia suffruticosa (Tree Paeony)

- Native to China
- Handsome deciduous shrub, probably extinct in the wild
- Prefers a cold winter, in a sheltered position in full sun or slightly filtered
- Grows 1.8 m tall by 1.8m wide
- Leaves are attractive large mid green leaves
- Flower heads are large, single or double in pink, red, white or yellow
- Flowers in spring
- Propagate from seed in Autumn or basal suckers
- Require minimal pruning, trimming off dead wood or weaker side shoots
- Mulch and feed with well rotted manure when leaf growth starts

What to do in the garden for September

- Tie Sweet Peas to supports
- Dahlia clumps left in the ground can be divided now
- Plant new perennials & pot on any cuttings
- Winter flowering Sasanqua Camellias can be pruned after flowering
- Feed Camelias, Rhodo's, Azaleas, Daphne, Pieris and Ericas with old animal manure
- Plant and repair lawns
- Still plant onion seedlings
- Tomato seedlings should not be planted yet (late frosts!!)
- Weeds are thriving after the lovely rain, keep them clear
- Spray Peaches and nectarines for leaf curl
- Prepare vegetable beds for spring planting
- Enjoy the spring bulbs
- Winter flowering Sasanqua Camellias can be pruned after flowering

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Around My Place at 'Hyland' by Margy Gardner

Establishing a new garden from newly cleared bush, battling strong westerly winds & sandy acid soil has been challenging but a new garden is exciting to plan.

In 8 years we have established the infrastructure & searched out plants that withstand the extremes of –8 to 40 degrees. Roses (some favourites are Pierre de Ronsard, Spirit of Peace, Julia, St Cecilia, Eglantyne, Seduction, New Dawn, Lamarque), irises that were mostly purchased at the Murrumbateman Field Days & wind break shrubs (Ceanothus, Pineapple Guava, Grevillia Pink Pearl & Grevillia Apricot Glow) are some of the many plants we have tried though there have been many non survivors.

Loads of mulch, botany hummus from Bungendore Rural & mushroom compost from Divalls in Goulburn, are regularly added to the beds & I'm grateful to my friend Sue Tuisk who has generously shared plants & advice.

My love of flowers has guided my choice of hardy plants & salvias have been a wonderful addition. Sue Templeton's Unlimited Perennials Nursery has one of the best range of salvias & her mail order is an efficient process. Salvias Macrophylla & Anthony Parker have flourished & this spring I will add White Hot, Meghans Magic & Winter Lipstick. Salvias are my latest favourite! Gaura, supposedly classified as a weed in NSW, has succeeded & of course Helleborus has been wonderful in its south facing bed.

Our recent acquisition of chooks & a chook 'palace' has given me great pleasure & each afternoon they are free ranging, hopefully giving my garden a fertilizing boost. Working in the garden with them also helps to deter foxes & predating birds & I love observing their characters. The coming of spring is my season of anticipation, daffodils budding, irises greening up, pruning of roses done, manchurian pear trees flushed with white buds, weeding & mulching like mad & now wonderful rain. My garden is waking up.
