PLANT OF THE MONTH

Veronica spicata

(Spike Speedwell)

- Native to Europe, Siberia & NW China
- Hardy clump forming perennial
- Hardy to -20 degrees
- Reaches a height of 60cm by 1m wide, dwarf varieties also
- Stems of blue, pink or white flowers are erect, hairy and branching
- Flowering in summer and autumn
- Prefers sun in well drained enriched soil
- Useful plants for borders in cooler climates

- Propagate from seed in Autumn or division in spring or autumn
- Good cultivars "Heidekind"(pink), "Blue Peter" and "Blaufuchs" (lavender)

What to do in the garden for April

- Trim evergreen shrubs so they recover before winter
- Choose trees for autumn colour
- Good time to plant or move Camellias, Rhodo's & Azaleas
- Look for Lilium, Hippeastrum & Sprekelia Bulbs
- Complete planting of spring bulbs
- Tidy leaves of Hellebores, Winter Iris & Aquilegias
- Sow Asian Greens, Broad Beans & Peas
- Plant all Brassicas (cover with fine netting against white butterflies, old lace curtains ideal!)
- Remove all old leaves from Strawberries (put in garbage)
- Remove 3 year old Strawberries & replace with new stock
- Repot herbs and pot plants with new potting mix
- Pick up any fallen fruit & dispose of if diseased
