In my garden by Helen Small

The last few weeks have been a big clean up time along my drive. A couple of very large privet like trees and a cotoneaster have been removed giving an airy feel. A liquid amber that would eventually have taken over the whole front yard has also been taken away. Wisteria has been removed from my side fence as much as possible. Wisteria and bamboo are growing from neighbour's yard – a jungle next door that wants to invade my yard. Now when I drive in I don't feel overhung by masses of branches and vines.

I am attempting to redesign the front garden and planted two persimmons and a Chinese quince for their lovely habit and eventually I hope some fruit.

Plants purchased on our trip last May to Beechworth are growing well and one salvia has beautiful large maroon spikes of flowers. The berberis also seems to like its spot and the rain has certainly aided growth.

In the vegetable garden I had a late start to planting but am now harvesting scarlet runner beans, zucchini, eggplant (little ones), tomatoes, cucumber and some potatoes. The tomatoes have been slow ripening with the cooler days but at last I have ripe ones to pick. It is hard to keep the grass under control – it's mowed and the next day seems to have grown inches. Even in the chook run where the orchard is located in a huge cage the chooks get overtaken by the grass and have to spring through the grass to see where they are going.

The quince trees are covered with fruit – I am looking forward to a good harvest – the first one since they were planted. I had some plums off two trees – the first since they were planted. The trees are still young.

An old nectarine tree that my son took a chainsaw to last winter has produced a great crop of nectarines – it obviously liked being pruned a lot. It had not borne any fruit in the previous 3 years I have been in the house.

Right at the back of my block in a strip of ground behind the cage the natives I planted (the ones that hadn't died) have put on huge growth with the rain. The acacias are growing rapidly along with various grevilleas, correas, and native rosemary. I am hoping to attract more little birds to keep down insect pests in the orchard.

Happy gardening and good luck keeping the weeds at bay.

Report on Yass Gardens & Crisp Gallery Visit

Our first stop was a town garden, at Pam Oldfield's Garden and we were met by a restful, blue water feature, a profusion of cottage garden colours and Pat at the top of her driveway. The front garden screened from the street by a low hedge of boarder plantings gave way around the side of the house to a welcoming outdoor entertaining area & the members of the Yass Garden Club had prepared a bountiful morning tea!

The garden was tastefully decorated with pottery, garden ornaments, a scarecrow, arches and furniture, but the plantings themselves really enthralled the visitors! Pat was kept busy naming and explaining her extensive range of plantings and design. Areas of roses, clematis, conifers, bulbs, many unusual and interesting plants, succulents and cottage garden plantings welcomed the visitor as they traversed each turn of the pathway network encircling the back garden. It was a very reluctant group that finally bid farewell and moved on to the next garden.

Wanda's garden was a newly designed garden receiving hot, day long sunshine and the plantings reflected hardiness and were mainly sun loving. A pergola extended across the back of the house allowing climbers for summer shade. The garden was divided into islands of raised beds, in a sea of gravel pathways. Each island provided splashes of colour with a mix of natives, bulbs and exotics of contrasting textures, colours, shapes and heights. Occasional garden ornaments enhanced the setting. Another lovely example of garden design.

Then on to the Crisp Gallery & Garden where we were warmly welcomed by Sandy Crisp & had lunch in their large art gallery/function centre. Sandy gave us a detailed guided tour of the garden with huge shady trees, glades of massed plantings, a large lake & garden rooms all interspersed with steel sculptures & large mosaic tiled walls. An impressive feature was a stone, fountain obelisk constructed around a windmill base, just another surprise to greet the wanderer through this impressive garden. Don't miss it if you have a chance. Peter Crisp then gave a talk in his studio on his work & the glass display was breathtaking. And then....the begonia & geranium nursery which few of us could resist & don't we all love to buy a plant or two?

Our last stop was at Ros's garden on the edge of town & that was a garden that impressed us all. A 1½ acre garden with shady trees, wandering paths through well mulched garden beds, a waterlily pond & then on to the chook yard & 12 wicking, raised, vegetable plots. After afternoon tea on the verandah we made our way home, sated by garden beauty.

What a feast! I wish you all could have come! Maybe next time.

Plant Of The Month by Kate Chinnick



Canna X generalis

- Native to tropical and South America
- Robust rhizomatous perennial
- Belongs to the same family as Ginger and Bananas
- Dies down in winter and survives frost if covered by mulch
- Prefers damp soil in full sun and love heavy feeding
- Leaves are broad and can be green, red, striped or purple
- Flowers are in all colours, also striped and spotted
- Many hybrids are in dwarf forms (1m) or tall (1.8m)
- Propagate from division in spring
- Useful for colour in summer and autumn

What to do in the garden for March

- Prepare areas for spring bulbs
- Plant new Trees, Shrubs, Climbers and Perennials

- Dead head Annuals and Perennials as flowers fade
- Overgrown Perennials can be divided now
- Sow Sweet Peas
- Autumn is the best time to transplant evergreen shrubs
- Complete planting of Asian Greens, Broccoli, Cabbage and Cauliflower
- Remove vegetable crops as they finish and compost
- Clean up fallen fruit under trees
- Clean out ponds and divide Water Iris and Lilies
- Prune Jasmine and late summer flowering Clematis
- Remove dead wood from deciduous shrubs and Roses
