Report of the Bundanoon Garden Visit

There were 32 members on our bus trip to Bundanoon & the Bundanoon Garden Club were marvellous hosts. Their morning tea spread was magnificent & we thank them warmly.

At our first stop at Suzy Molyneux's garden, we all admired the Pieris Japonica or "Lily of the Valley" shrub, which was almost a small tree. Also the enormous Rhododrendrons which were probably planted in the 1930's. And the amazing welcome and morning tea, served in Suzy's lovely 1930's house.

In Noelene's garden next door, people commented on the dwarf flowering peach trees at the front door. At the back, we all noticed the evergreen clematis "Sweetheart", the Magnolia Lennei Alba, and the white Daphne. Also two very beautiful weeping "Bogong Snow" camellias, with small, delicate white flowers.

At Julie-Anne and Trevor's garden, the careful design, taking advantage of the location was impressive. Sloping down from a curved hedge of cypress, then another hedge of laurel, there were some beautiful trees underplanted with bulbs, iris and perennials. Unusual plants included the bed of Geranium Maderense, which produces blue flowers and then seeds prolifically. Hydrangea Petiolarus was very happy climbing on an old stump and in the vege patch, a Clematis "Fireworks" climbed on an old farm gate. The "women's shed", recently constructed by Trevor, was admired by all. We add a grateful "thankyou" to our very capable bus driver, Alan Lukie, who had very a long day.

The nursery in Bundanoon village had a great selection of plants suited to our climate and many people bought plants they had seen in the gardens we visited. We all hope they will thrive in our climate, which is a bit more demanding than the Southern Highlands.

Tablelands Nursery Visit

On a snowy day, 7 hardy members travelled to The Tablelands Nursery and were warmly welcomed by John & Shilo Bowe. The garden is in a bush setting with beautiful spring flowering trees & shrubs, underplanted with perennials & ground covers. This year Bundanoon celebrates its 150th anniversary and the Garden Ramble will be showcasing gardens from some of the more historic properties in town.

A visit to the Bundanoon Community Garden is highly recommended. Participate in gardening workshops and/or purchase goodies for your table. This garden is situated in Elsmore Rd.

As well as the garden visits there will be a Garden Market in the Bundanoon Hall where plants and gifts can be purchased. Around My Garden at Araluen by Sue Quinnell

Spring always holds a feeling of expectation. Never knowing if the plants and trees that have been tucked up in bed asleep will awaken and produce the picture that matches the one in your head. Very rarely do they disappoint. We feel quite self- satisfied this year as we have had the time to do most of the preparation required. The pruning, spraying and fertilizing has been done but of course it's an ongoing activity that repeats throughout the growing season.

The daffodils and snowdrops have been awake for a couple of weeks now and I can see that the flowering plum and the Manchurian pears are ready to burst into life. It's so wonderful to walk around the garden at this time of year to see something new happening every day.

The polyanthus are a delight at the moment as they provide a burst of vivid colour on either side of the front steps and the cyclamens are still blooming in the old pot belly stove that now is used as a pot plant holder, just outside our lounge room window. Len has been busy over the last few weeks building a rock retaining wall. It has been a tricky job trying to fit the rocks together, much like a jigsaw puzzle but it is finally taking shape. A new box hedge will be planted along the top side with a few trailing plants to hang over the wall to soften the edges.

This is my favourite time of the year, just before the summer heat takes its toll on the plants and trees and me. Every day is a joy to walk around our garden and find something new happening.



PLANT OF THE MONTH by Kate Chinnick



Skimmia japonica

- Native to Japan, from the Rutaceae family
- Dense medium-sized shrub, shaped like a dome
- Dark evergreen leaves, slow growing
- Flowers are small, white or red and fragrant produced in terminal panicles
- Followed by red, globular fruits
- Tolerates shade and harsh conditions
- Require minimal pruning, can be trimmed for hedges
- Propagate from tip cuttings
- Needs both sexes to produce good fruit

What to do in the garden for October

- Prune flowering shrubs as they finish flowering
- Thin out Camelias and shorten branches
- Azaleas should be clipped back and remove any dead wood
- Roses will respond to fertiliser & added water from mid month
- Remove last years dead growth from Begonias and Fuchsias
- Nip out Sweet Pea shoots to encourage lateral growth
- Plant out dahlia tubers (insert stakes before planting)
- Gladiolus corms can be planted at two weekly intervals (90 to 100 days to flowering)
- Dead head annuals and bulbs
- Feed bulbs with fertiliser high in potash for next years flowers
- Sow seeds of Tomatoes, Zucchini, Silver Beet, Beans & cabbage
- Make supports for Peas and climbing Beans
- Mulch well to hold in the moisture
