#### Report on the Plant Fair at the Lanyon Homestead on Saturday 12th March by Pat Maher

Margy, Janniece, Sally, Maureen and I set off for Lanyon in two cars on Saturday morning, all hoping to buy some interesting plants and enjoy the surrounds of the beautiful old homestead. We left Ryrie Park about 8.30 and arrived at 10.00am thinking we would be early but there was already quite a crowd.

Just at the entry, our old friends from the Tablelands Trees & Shrubs Nursery had set up their wares and I bought a white penstemon, 'Huskers Red' with a broad leaf that I had not seen before. The plan was to have a good look around before buying but the urge to buy was too strong and we decided to split up and meet up again at 12.30 for lunch.

I purchased two roses, a climbing pink Alister Clark 'Mrs Fred Danks' and 'Mutabilis', very healthy plants

for \$18 each and also two Sanguisorbas 'Cangshan Cranberry' and 'Blackthorn' long flowering perennials from Yellow House Heritage Perennials, Nowra. A low spreading banksia (yellow candle) from Australian Native Plant Nursery 'Sun Valley', Dandenong, some daffodil bulbs 'Silver Chimes' and mini daffodil 'Tete a Tete' and two pots of succulents Kalanchoe 'Kandy Kane' and xDisphyllum 'Sunburn' (<a href="www.australiansucculents.com">www.australiansucculents.com</a>) were too hard to resist. All 5 of us made substantial purchases so the cars returning home were overflowing with plants.

Lunch was shared under a shady tree and the many stalls provided a good variety of food and coffee, and we then went to a demonstration of flower arranging by Marilyn Carle our BGC member. Beautiful!! A lovely day out and a big 'thank you' to Margy and Sally for driving.

The WARATAH features in our club notices & on our name tags and this month I have sourced a change to the usual image of this beautiful flower used in our newsletter.

The Waratah(*Telopea*) is of course the state floral emblem of NSW and has been used in much of Australia's decorative art...stained glass windows, porcelain, woodwork and stonework. It is ideally grown in dappled light, mimicking the natural growing environment and white, pink and yellow hybrids as well as the common crimson are available in nurseries. The Braidwood Nursery had the hybrid *Telopea* 'Braidwood Brilliant' for sale last year.

#### **IN MY GARDEN** by Margy Gardner

Like most of you at this time, I am watering constantly and hoping for the forecast rain in the next few days. Catmint, Salvias, the Escallonia hedge and the Teucrium Fruticans are all surviving the dry so well. Self-sown cherry tomatoes are in abundance, as usual, and the self-sown pumpkins, growing inconveniently in the front garden, have 3 large pumpkins waiting till just before the first frost to harvest. Early in the season they started their climb up the Pierre de Ronsard climbing rose before I redirected their path in a better direction. Roses are flushing again with frequent applications of dynamic lifter and a special favourite is 'Spirit of Peace', a mellow apricot colour. Also giving much pleasure are the Manchurian Pear trees which are a picture of autumn colour and irises preparing for their October display tantalise with anticipation. Autumn is beginning.....happy gardening to you all.

## PLANT OF THE MONTH by Kate Chinnick



# Nicotiana sylvestris

- Native of the Andean foothills of N W Argentina
- A short lived perennial or biennial species
- Grows to two metres tall and one metre wide
- Leaves large and bright green
- Stems stout, branching with a woody base
- Flowers white and highly perfumed
- Good contrast plant for the back of a border
- Does particularly well in shade

#### What to do in the garden for April

- Trim evergreen shrubs so they recover before winter
- Choose trees for autumn colour
- Good time to plant or move Camellias, Rhodo's & Azaleas
- Look for Lilium, Hippeastrum & Sprekelia Bulbs
- Complete planting of spring bulbs
- Tidy leaves of Hellebores, Winter Iris & Aquilegias
- Sow Asian Greens, Broad Beans & Peas
- Plant all Brassicas (cover with fine netting against white butterflies, old lace curtains ideal!)
- Remove all old leaves from Strawberries (put in garbage)
- Remove 3 year old Strawberries & replace with new stock
- Repot herbs and pot plants with new potting mix
- Pick up any fallen fruit & dispose of if diseased
