Apple-tree grafting and lunch at the Old Cheese factory in Reidsdale

On July 13th we will meet at the Old Cheese Factory in Reidsdale, where Gary Watkins-Sully will give us a demonstration of apple-tree grafting. Gary has found and propagated many old apple trees from the Braidwood District since settling here with his extended family in 2001. Many of these were cider apples, and Gary has revived the art of apple juice and cider-making from local apples. Gary will also talk to us about the apples he has discovered and the history of apple-growing in the district.

The Watkins-Sully family began their food-related businesses in Braidwood with the very successful Deli, which they operated in Wallace St. They then moved to the Old Cheese Factory, where they have branched out into a number of other food-related enterprises. These are aimed at reviving the production and processing of food locally, based on surviving evidence of these industries in the past. A Sunday afternoon lunch at the Old Cheese factory, with a simple menu using wholesome local foods as much as possible, is one of the highlights of living in this area.

REPORT FROM OUR GARDEN MEETING IN JUNE

All about Roses

Our Rose Forum was held on June 8th, with 29 members in attendance. Our presenters, Kate Chinnick and Dennis Dempsey, shared with us their extensive knowledge of roses and their experiences in growing them in our region. They also communicated their great love of the rose in all its forms.

Kate began her garden at Reidsdale 19 years ago. A visit to Kate's garden in Spring is an unforgettable experience, with hundreds of different roses in flower. However, the garden began with an unsuccessful attempt at growing hybrid tea roses. Kate then began to search for old-fashioned or heritage roses, and the garden grew from there.

Kate gave us a summary of the different types of roses and their history, accompanied by some beautiful photos. The history of roses goes back to ancient times and to many different places. As Kate discovered, once a passion for roses and their history takes hold, it never leaves you. Everyone has a favourite rose, and while they can be demanding at times in terms of care, we are repaid every Spring with their indescribable beauty.

Dennis gave us an insight into the practicalities of caring for roses. Like Kate, he is passionate about them. Through long experience at the rose gardens at Old Parliament House, he has developed a system of caring for the wonderful collection of roses

there. Dennis shared his tips for fertilising, pruning, and pest control, and talked about some of the many roses on display in these beautiful gardens.

In looking at ways to prune the different types of roses, it became clear that this is much more complicated than it seems. Dennis has kindly offered to hold a pruning demonstration in his own garden, in late winter. He will even allow us to practise on his own roses! We will let you know when this will be held in the next newsletter. We will aim for a date in mid-August.

Thanks to the Braidwood Servicemens Club for making their excellent facilities available to us. Michelle is always extremely helpful, and makes sure everything run very smoothly. Thanks also to members for the great lunch provided, and to Kate Chinnick for donating the raffle prize – a rose, of course!

IN MY GARDEN by Maureen Stachow

Leaves, leaves! I am glad the deciduous trees and shrubs only shed them once a year. However one of the best things I have bought to use in the garden is a petrol blower. I don't think I could live without it.

Although it is winter in the garden now, there are quite a few plants giving off a show of colour, such as the flowering Quinces, Winter Gladiolias and Tree Dahlias. The Red Hot Pokers are flowering well this year and have not been affected by the frosts that we have had. I have a Lavatera which flowers all year in the garden and it is well worth finding for its flowering.

Along one side fence of the garden I planted a hedge of mixed Camellias (58 in all). The Sasanquas have started flowering and soon the Japonicas will flower. I am pleased they have done so well as they are quite exposed to the elements. I mulch them with horse manure and I am sure they like it.

I have started a lot of cutting back. The Budlehias like a good pruning as well as the Canna Lillies and some perennials and grasses. There are a few Chinese Elms in the garden and I just planted another 8.

The vegetable garden is a bit bare, with just a few capsicums trying their best. Last year I tried a Climbing Spinach just for interest and it did really well. Now I am adding lots of manure and turning the beds over for Spring planting.

Rudi likes to make concreted stone walls and he is now building a wall behind the house. He likes to set flat statues into the walls which makes them quite unique and interesting.

Anyway I am hoping the garden is "Spring ready" - a beanie and three layers of clothing seems to help on colder days!

PLANT OF THE MONTH by Kate Chinnick



Chimonanthus praecox

(Wintersweet)

- Native to China
- Deciduous shrub 3m x 3m
- Leaves glossy green turning yellow in autumn
- Flowers form on second year wood in winter on bare stems
- Very fragrant scent wafts around the bare garden!
- Scented flowers can be dried to fragrance linen
- Prefers a sheltered position in full or part sun
- Propagate from cuttings in summer or seed when ripe
- Shrubs grown from seed take 5 10 years to flower

What to do in the garden for July

- Remove flower buds from spring annuals for better displays
- Rhododendrons, Azaleas & Camelias will need watering leading to blooming
- Prune Wisterias and deciduous climbers
- Prune later flowering shrubs (not spring flowerers)
- Order summer flowering bulbs Liliums etc.
- Clean up prunings from fruit trees and mulch
- Sow Globe Artichoke and Asparagus seeds
- Clean and sharpen secateurs, loppers and saws
- Sand and oil (linseed oil) wooden handles on tools
- Turn over vegetable beds for spring plantings
- Watch for pink bud swell on early Peaches & Nectarines & spray for leaf curl with copper or lime sulphur
