ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING, Thursday 10th AUGUST

Report From Our Last Meeting at The Old Cheese Factory, Reidsdale on JULY 13th

Quite a few of our members have escaped the cold winter and travelled to warmer climates both in Australia and overseas. We were therefore very pleased that 17 members gathered at the Cheese Factory on 13th July, to enjoy a delicious lunch and a fascinating talk and demonstration by Gary Watkins-Sully. Gary shared his knowledge of different apple varieties and the history of apple growing and cider production in this area, and showed us how to graft apple trees. Gary has rediscovered some very old apple varieties in the Braidwood district, and has revived the local crafts of apple juice and cider production.

A lively Q and A session followed, and Gary then showed us some of the grafted trees he is cultivating in the vege patch, beside the Cheese Factory. For those who want to acquire the skill of apple grafting, and share more of Gary's insights and knowledge, two Apple Tree Grafting Workshops are being held on Saturday August 12th at the Old Cheese Factory. The three hour workshops include coffee or tea on arrival, lunch/afternoon tea, two grafted apple trees, and detailed instruction and notes. The inclusive cost is \$110. PLANT OF THE MONTH by Kate Chinnick



Leucojum

"Snowflake"

- Bulb native to central Europe
- Blooms late in winter
- Grows to 45cm high
- Prefers a fertile moist soil in a sunny position or part shade
- Naturalises freely, making small clumps
- Frost hardy
- Flower heads are white, bell shaped and marked with a green spot
- Propagate from division in summer

What to do in the garden for August

- Prune and spray Roses later this month
- Plant new bare rooted Roses (soak in seaweed solution before planting)
- Plant summer and autumn flowering bulbs
- Winter flowering shrubs can be pruned now
- Prune and feed Daphne after flowering
- Prune Crepe Myrtle, which flowers on new wood
- Cut ornamental grass clumps to the ground
- Perennials may be divided as the weather warms up
- Prune Jasmines and summer flowering Clematis
- Prune Hydrangeas to two strong buds
- Spray Peaches and nectarines for leaf curl
- Plant Onion seedlings, Asparagus crowns & Spinach seedlings
- Check herbs for dividing and replanting
- Prepare vegetable beds for spring planting
