MARCH Thursday 8th

Gardens In and Around Braidwood

After a very hot dry summer, we are all looking for ways to help our gardens survive the heat. We are very grateful that 4 of our members have agreed to open their gardens for us on March 8th. All these gardens are relatively new, and therefore don't have the advantage of established trees to provide shade in summer. This is a great opportunity to discuss ideas to combat the heat and create attractive and productive gardens.

Our morning will commence with a visit to John & Margaret Tuckwell's new house and garden in Wilson St. The house was completed in November 2017 with garden at its very early stage of development. It is situated on a 2400m2 block which was the site of the original Anglican Church and has been a market garden and then a nursery. It features some lovely established elm trees, the start of a rose garden and a vegie patch. John & Margaret have great plans for the garden's staged future development, having clear ideas about parts of the garden and open to suggestions for other parts. It is hoped we will see the garden evolve over the years to come.

Janniece Elphick has developed her garden from scratch, in 7 years, and like some of our gardens, has grown like topsy. Many of her plants are gifts from family and friends with cuttings from local gardens. It is a cottage style garden with fruit trees and suggestions for a tree selection would be welcome.

John and Charmian Thomas's garden was started in 2010 as the house was being built with a silver birch the first tree, then a variety of plants to compliment each other with foliage, colour, height and shape. Braidwood's testing temperatures were a high consideration in plant selection. Roses are very rewarding and vegetable beds, though suffering from the summer heat, are quite productive.

Margaret Royds left the large, cold 'Bedervale' homestead for a new home, 'Bohun House'. Margaret didn't plan to have a garden in her new home, just a few pot plants in the courtyard in front and wildflowers on the banks. So the bank at the back had to be cleared and terraced, beds made, mulched and smothered with wood chips to keep the grass at bay until ground covers and shrubs could take over; paths made with sawdust and a set of steps. The front bank was supposed to be a Ha-ha but was a steep slope so it was covered it with prostrate grevillea. The westerly wind needed hedges for protection and the underground water tank in the front which looked like a helicopter pad was covered with soil and mushroom compost and planted out with thyme, surrounded by box hedge. Margaret's garden has expanded with trees, an orchard, 300 flowering natives and shows her love of gardening and gardens.

We will have morning tea at Janniece's garden, then move on to Margaret's garden within the Bedervale estate on the edge of town. Members with surnames from M-Z, it's your turn to provide a plate for morning tea. If you plan to join us for lunch at Margaret's garden, with a lovely view to the east, please bring a picnic lunch, a chair and a coffee mug and don't forget to waer your name tag. Tea and coffee will be provided.

THE GARDEN PARTY NELLIGEN

If you have travelled from Canberra to the coast along the Kings Highway you may have noticed the houses at the top of the hill at Nelligen. You know the one, it's opposite the River Road turnoff. The one with the poplar lined driveway that wraps around hills of mown grass paddocks. Well, now is your chance to sticky beak.

The properties are owned by sisters Sandra Martin and Glenda Blanch along with her husband Paul. The girls' family have lived in Nelligen since its settlement and on that particular patch for 7 generations. Originally there was a little cottage that stood on what was once the dairy farm that supplied the village of Nelligen with milk, cream and eggs. The sisters, who grew up in Liverpool, remember school holidays at Nan and Pop's, helping in the garden and playing cake shops with dried cow pats for cakes! Although a little more sophisticated these days, the girls haven't lost their youthful enthusiasm for their family home, days in the garden and homemade treats

Inspired by iconic Australian gardens and the English country aesthetic, the sisters share a passion for old-fashioned roses, many of which can be found in Sandra's garden while Glenda has over 70 roses in her garden including climbing roses and standards. Both gardens have an extensive range of deciduous trees such as Pin Oaks, Chinese Pistachios, Silver Birch, Silver Elms, Weeping Mulberry, Golden Elms and tree lined driveways of Bradford Pears and Chinese Tallow. Both gardens mix formal structure with vegetable patches and rambling cottage flower beds.

You are invited to come along and find out exactly what is at the top of that hill. You may also find plants for sale depending on the season.

There will be a \$5 per person donation (included in the overall fee for the day) for this visit to the South Coast Lantern Club. PLANT OF THE MONTH by Kate Chinnick



Eucomis comosa

(Pineapple lily)

- Hardy bulbs, dormant in winter
- Native of South Africa
- Grows to a height of 75cm
- Flowers from summer to autumn
- Attractive spikes of small star shaped flowers, white, green or purple
- Propagate from seed or division in spring
- The Xhosa peoples used the bulbs boiled to a paste as a cure for rheumatism

What to do in the garden for March

- Prepare areas for spring bulbs
- Continue tying Dahlias
- Dead head annuals and perennials as flowers fade
- Overgrown perennials can be divided
- Sow sweet Peas
- Plant or move evergreen shrubs now before cooler weather
- Feed roses for good autumn blooms
- Prune Jasmines and late flowering Clematis
- Remove dead wood from deciduous shrubs and Roses
- Plant Asian Greens, Broccoli, Cabbage & Cauliflower
- Remove finished vegetable crops and compost
- Pick up any fallen fruit& dispose of if diseased
