

Esther Dean's Growing without Digging

I believe this sort of gardening works. As an experiment I have been dumping my kitchen scraps in a particular bed in the community garden; I then have covered it with grass clippings and other garden clipping, the last layer being a thick piece of wet card board. The worms have come back! Although an old book, it's worth a read.



Kate's Tips

Just in case you haven't gotten around to doing the following in February:

- Lift Tulips and Dutch Iris for storage in a cool dry place
- Tie Dahlias and tall Chrysanthemums
- Dead head Rhododendrons, Camelias and Azaleas, mulch and feed
- Sow seeds of annuals for planting out in April
- This humid weather promotes black spot spray if necessary
- Remove weeds before they seed
- Obtain spring flowering bulbs
- Sow seeds of Asian Greens, Radish, Spinach and Turnips
- · Remove vegetable plants as they finish cropping
- Apply liquid fertilizer fortnightly to vegetables
- Remove excess growth from Apples and Pears
- Trim Lavender and Rosemary
- Take semi hardwood cuttings and keep moist

However read on.....

What to do in March

- Prepare areas for spring bulbs
- Continue tying Dahlias
- Dead head annuals and perennials as flowers fade
- Overgrown perennials can be divided
- Sow sweet Peas
- Plant or move evergreen shrubs now before cooler weather
- · Feed roses for good autumn blooms
- Prune Jasmines and late flowering Clematis
- Remove dead wood from deciduous shrubs and Roses
- Plant Asian Greens, Broccoli, Cabbage & Cauliflower
- Remove finished vegetable crops and compost
- Pick up any fallen fruit& dispose of if diseased

Plant of the month – Sedum Spectabile (Ice Plant)

- Native to China and Korea
- A perennial with fleshy grey green leaves
- Resistant to both frost and dry conditions
- Flowers in late summer
- Grows to 45cm high and 45cm wide
- Flowers come in white, pale pink and rose-pink
- Grows well in most soil types
- Propagate from division or cuttings in spring
