Kate's Tips

Just in case you haven't gotten around to doing the following in July

- Remove flower buds from spring annuals for better displays
- Rhododendrons, Azaleas & Camelias will need watering leading to blooming
- Prune Wisterias and deciduous climbers
- Prune later flowering shrubs (not spring flowerers)
- Order summer flowering bulbs Liliums etc.
- Clean up prunings from fruit trees and mulch
- Sow Globe Artichoke and Asparagus seeds
- Clean and sharpen secateurs, loppers and saws
- Sand and oil (linseed oil) wooden handles on tools
- Turn over vegetable beds for spring plantings
- Watch for pink bud swell on early Peaches & Nectarines & spray for leaf curl with copper or lime sulphur

Read on for

What to do in August

- Prune and spray Roses later this month
- Plant new bare rooted Roses (soak in seaweed solution before planting)
- Plant summer and autumn flowering bulbs
- Winter flowering shrubs can be pruned now
- Prune and feed Daphne after flowering
- Prune Crepe Myrtle, which flowers on new wood
- Cut ornamental grass clumps to the ground
- Perennials may be divided as the weather warms up
- Prune Jasmines and summer flowering Clematis
- Prune Hydrangeas to two strong buds
- Spray Peaches and nectarines for leaf curl

Plant Onion seedlings, Asparagus crowns & Eamp; Spinach seedlings Check herbs for dividing and replanting Prepare vegetable beds for spring planting

Plant of the month – Narcissus (Daffodil)



- Native to Europe, Asia and North Africa
- Hardy bulbs which are easy to grow
- Many cultivars have been developed
- Have been divided into 12 divisions, depending on variety
- Flowers in winter and spring
- Flower colours come in white, yellow, red, orange or pink
- They enjoy full sun in cool areas and partial shade in warmer
- Propagate from division or seed in Autumn
- Allow leaves to die down before removing
